DRAFT MINUTES

Call to Order: Chair Shey Conover called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM and a quorum was established.

MOTION BY P. Seymour, seconded by M. Burns, to approve the minutes of August 2, 2023 Regular Meeting, as written. No discussion. Motion passed, 5 yes, 0 no.

VISITOR COMMENTS/PETITIONS

Dick DeGrasse requested to be placed on the next agenda and distributed material regarding his proposal to establish Municipal Electric Power on Islesboro. S. Conover stated this topic can be on the agenda in two weeks (August 30). M. Burns asked Dick to clarify whether he was here as a representative of the Energy Committee. He stated he is not representing the Energy Committee on this issue.

FERRY SERVICE UPDATE

John King reported on MSFS updates.

- After the last Select Board meeting, J. King sent an email to Bill Pulver, COO of Maine DOT, summarizing the Select Board discussion on the Tariff issues. Bill Pulver sent a thank-you note back.
- J. King provided the Board with a spreadsheet illustrating DOT's estimate of
 possible tariff increase scenarios if the bulk is implemented in the peak season
 instead of having an 18% increase across the board.
 - o Rates if 100% of the increase in the peak season
 - o Rates if 75% of the increase in the peak season
 - o Rates if 60% of the increase in the peak season
- We need to improve communication issues. We have no coherent framework right now; the 511 system isn't working well. The most effective communication currently is Facebook, which is not reliable. Maybe loop Fred in. John sent an email to Bill Geary asking about the 511 system glitches, and he's investigating.
- Article in Maine Beacon 8/14: ferry service system possible collapse because of wage issues. Morale of the captains and crew not high.

- It might be helpful to have some kind of Thank you to the Ferry crew from the Town for past two years, possibly a potluck, or a proclamation. L. Bruce requested that we put on future agenda to brainstorm ideas. Maggy Willcox suggested "Be Nice to Ferry Crew Week," when folks can inundate them with baked goods and warm thoughts. Crew changes Mondays.
- · Discussion about Tariff chart scenarios.
- P. Seymour asked about ridership statistics in terms of what the impact would be
 if any of these scenarios is applied. J. King answered that this concept is to try to
 maximize revenue when demand is highest, while minimizing demand
 destruction, which is what happened with Tariff 8, when ridership fell of
 dramatically, but it's never been done, so it's difficult to predict the impact.
- We're also asking for consideration of a resident tariff.
- M. Burns asked if there was a noticeable decrease in summer visitors during Tariff 8. J. King stated the ridership was mostly affected during the off season.
- L. Bruce suggested that there may not be demand destruction if the peak-season increase were combined with a resident discount.
- S. Conover stated she felt that a 100% increase in the peak season would create demand destruction, but felt more comfortable with the 60% or 75% scenarios.
 She advocated for recognition of a more consumer-friendly system (commuter-friendly, senior citizen rates, resident rates).
- M. Burns asked if there was any more discussion about the reservation rates. J.
 King answered that we are probably the only island that drives revenue with
 reservations; it's not a big item for revenue. Each island does it differently.
- L. Bruce requested to put on future agenda the Unfunded Retirement Liability Fund issue for discussion.
- J. King stated he will send something to Bill Pulver stating the Select Board is interested in making sure that island residents, particularly senior island residents, are fairly delt with, which can be done with a resident rate, a senior discount, and/or a reasonable commuter pass, and that those concerns can be alleviated by putting additional revenue into the peak season, between 60-75%. L. Bruce and S. Conover responded that the priority is residents and commuters. We want to prioritize this being a place where year-round families can afford to live.
- J. King will draft something for the ferry service.
- S. Conover stated the communication issue is worth further discussion.
- Send note of Thanks for quick repair of the Lincolnville ramp to Bill Geary.

SEA LEVEL RISE

S. Conover reported that the committee is continuing the small group discussions. We will have a draft engineering RFQ out in the next few weeks.

MUNICIPAL BUILDING PROJECT

- L. Bruce reported that the Islesboro Health Center application should be approved this coming Monday at the Planning Board meeting. Gartley & Dorsky sent an updated plan for the Up-Island Public Safety Garage.
- P. Anderson asked about housing for construction workers, and to what extent that's being provided. How much money are we spending on this? L. Bruce answered that H.E. Callahan, the construction manager, is making the arrangements. There will be a cost to us, but there will actually be savings, because we'll be saving on travel expenses. M. Burns asked if this will be listed as a line-item, and when we will be getting a line-item budget. L. Bruce answered that they are talking about guaranteeing a maximum price around September 28th.

UPDATE: 'Margaret Chase Smith' ferry crew rescues kayaker in distress off of Islesboro in heavy storm

ISLESBORO – Crew members aboard the Maine State Ferry Margaret Chase Smith rescued a kayaker midafternoon, Aug. 25, as she was attempting to make a short crossing from Warren Island to Grindle Point on Islesboro and found herself instead being pushed out into Penobscot Bay in a fierce storm.

UPDATE

In an Aug. 26 conversation with Able Bodied Seaman Kristain Rudman, who was one of the *Margaret Chase Smith* crew members who got into a 12-foot lifeboat to rescue the woman, he described how she was holding tightly to her overturned kayak.

"We were departing Lincolnville at 2 p.m." he said. "As we made our way across the bay, we spotted an overturned kayak about 300 yards off of the Islesboro lighthouse near the end of the pier. Looking through binoculars, we didn't see anybody with the kayak. So

we proceeded into the pen, offloaded all of the cars, and the captain made a decision to go investigate just to make sure that nobody was there.

"As we made our way over to the kayak, and looking through binoculars, we saw somebody hanging over the edge of the kayak.

"We got close enough and could see that the woman was in distress so we knew she would not be able to climb the ladder into the boat. The captain made the decision to launch the recovery boat. We went out, picked her up, and took her into the town pier where the Sheriff and EMS were waiting.

"Everyone was very professional, and they were there instantly," he said.







Rudman was with another of the ABs in the rescue boat. Rudman had served 20 years in the U.S. Coast Guard all over the country, including Woods Hole, Portland and the Great Lakes, and is now working with the Maine Ferry Service, rotating aboard its various ferries.

Rudman and his fellow AB pulled the woman three feet over the side of the 12-foot boat, in high waves.

According to Rudman, the woman told him that she had been in the water for 30 to 40 minutes.

"When we got her in the boat, she was coherent," he said. "She knew where she was and what she was doing.

"She had gotten knocked out her kayak and could not get back in, and with the wind and current, she was being sent toward Belfast."

As for the good fortune that the ferry crew spotted her?

"That's why lookouts are posted," said Rudman. "We were doing what we were trained to do."

He is not a full-time member of the Margaret Chase Smith, but they practice drills together.

"It shows that the drills the crews run on a weekly basis pays, because everybody knows what to do. Everybody was calm, and the captain made the right decisions. And it was a good outcome. That's the best part."

Strong southeast winds blowing 21 knots and gusting up to 27 knots had sent her kayak toward open water on a northwest trajectory near the Grindle Point Lighthouse. Her nine-foot kayak — not a sea kayak — was reportedly being swamped and overturned, as witnesses on Grindle Point watched her become increasingly imperiled.

The incident occurred as the *Margaret Chase Smith* was pulling out of the ferry pen at Grindle Point on Islesboro and heading on her regular 2:30 p.m. run to Lincolnville Beach. The storm had strengthened during the afternoon; further down the bay at a buoy off of Owls Head, seas were reported at seven feet.

On a calm day, Warren Island is an easy paddle from the ferry landing and parking lot at Grindle Point, but in a southeast storm, conditions can be treacherous

Christopher Molloy, a mate aboard the marine taxi service vessel *Quicksilver*, was arriving at Grindle Point to join Captain Sean Farley for a run to Lincolnville Beach. He first noticed people milling around Grindle Point, looking north. Then he saw the *Margaret Chase Smith* north of the lighthouse, a couple of hundred yards offshore.

At first he thought the ferry itself had lost power and was in distress, but then he noticed ferry crew quickly launching a rescue vessel equipped with an outboard from the *Margaret Chase Smith*. Two crew members raced to the kayaker and pulled her aboard their lifeboat. They then transported her back to Grindle Point to a waiting ambulance.

Molloy and Farley assisted in the effort, recovering the kayak and the woman's gear.

"When we came up to it, it is more than filled up with water," said Molloy.

The woman appeared to be alright, said Molloy, and first responders were warming her.

The Margaret Chase Smith returned to the Grindle Point ferry pen, along with the rescue boat.

"The amazing thing is how those ferry guys saw what was happening and made a beeline to her," he said. "They did not hesitate."

Islesboro Electric Power

Islesboro Residential Electric Power Current and Future Use

After a year-long review of Islesboro's electrical demand including in person and electronic communication with the Maine Public Utility Commission, Central Maine Power, Verrill Law firm in Portland, Maine and the major power supplier to our island New Brunswick Power, I discovered an important opportunity for Islesboro island-wide power cost savings and energy conservation based on establishing an Islesboro municipal power entity. Such an entity would contract for less expensive power directly from the power supplier and at the same time create a fund for future Islesboro power projects such as electric ferry battery charging, solar/battery farm, electric thermal storage space heating and other island-wide energy conservation projects.

Cost Savings

Since all of us receive monthly electric bills from Central Maine Power (CMP), I started my review of electric power costs using my latest CMP bill. My bill is typical of all Islesboro electric bills. The top of page 1 of my monthly residential bill contains 2 separate charges: CMP Delivery and Non-CMP Supplier Standard Offer. Under Maine law regulated by the Maine Public Utility Commission, CMP controls only the CMP delivery charge. The Non-CMP Supplier Standard Offer charge noted on page 1 and detailed on page 3 of the CMP bill is for electric power supply only and not CMP delivery. The Standard Offer power supply portion of the bill is significantly greater than the CMP Delivery charge. Therein lies the reason for Islesboro's electric bills being 20-25% higher than other Vermont and Maine municipalities I know of who own and maintain their own electric power delivery systems. The power supply costs are the problem and since CMP owns and maintains Islesboro's power delivery system, we are required to buy power supply at retail prices whereas municipalities who own and maintain their own delivery system, Madison Electric and North Haven here in Maine are 2 examples. They buy power supply at wholesale prices direct from the supplier. The difference between retail and wholesale power is about 20-25%. Would it make sense for Islesboro to buy CMP's system here on the island and take over running and maintaining our own delivery system so we can buy cheaper wholesale power? Maine law separates electric power delivery from power supply in CMP service area and, in my opinion, CMP does a good job of delivering power and maintaining the system at about \$0.10/kWh. Buying out CMP would be very expensive and increase our rates to pay the debt service. In my experience Islesboro running a small municipal electric system, cannot be done any better or less expensive than \$0.010/kWh CMP charges today.

For over a year I have worked with all the electric power entities involved in serving Islesboro: CMP, the Maine Public Utility Commission, New Brunswick Power and Verrill Law, the utility law firm in Portland, Maine. New Brunswick Power provides 67% of Islesboro's electric power today. New Brunswick Power's mix of generation is ½ hydro and ¼ nuclear, plus renewables

and some thermal energy primarily for electric power peak generation. New Brunswick Power is one of the largest utilities in this part of the continent. They are regulated by the Canadian Provincial Government and by the Maine Public Utility Commission. New Brunswick Power has visited Islesboro on 2 separate occasions to discuss supplying us with 100% of our electric power. I asked them during their visit about the cost of wholesale power to Islesboro. While we have no power supply contract with New Brunswick Power as yet, they told me they could supply Islesboro power to be delivered metered and billed by CMP at less than \$0.10/kWh. Page 3 on my CMP bill Standard Offer is priced at \$0.176310/kWh. The difference between the Standard Offer and New Brunswick Power supply rate is \$0.176310 - \$0.10 = \$0.076310/kWh. That's a significant potential savings to everyone on our island. Islesboro uses on average 500,000 kWh/month x \$0.076310/kWh = \$38,155 potential power cost savings each month.

Islesboro Municipal Electric Power Opportunities

Knowing the potential savings and future conservation opportunities, I discussed various possibilities with the Maine Public Utility Commission, CMP, New Brunswick Power and the Verrill law firm in Portland on how Islesboro could create a municipal entity able to legally purchase wholesale power from New Brunswick Power to replace the Standard Offer. Power which would be delivered, metered and billed by CMP just as CMP does now. The municipal entity would contract for power with New Brunswick Power and would at the same time build a fund for future energy conservation projects such as the electric ferry, solar/battery systems and electric thermal storage heating. We need an Islesboro municipal power purchasing agent. In legal terms such an entity is called an "Electric Energy Aggregation Group". Based on my experience and many discussions and email communications, such an entity would be acceptable to the Maine Public Utility Commission and New Brunswick Power provided it is carefully drafted along guidelines provided by the Maine Public Utility Commission. During my consideration of a municipal entity, the Maine Public Utilities Commission suggested we consult the Verrill Law Firm in Portland, Maine. The Verrill Law Firm is a large, multistate law firm experienced with power supply aggregation groups. The Verrill Law Firm has since provided me with a detailed proposal "Formation of Electric Energy Aggregation Group" along with a quote for their services. Once we have created an Islesboro electric power entity, we would then negotiate an annual contract with New Brunswick Power for power supply as do other municipalities. We could add a 2% fee to be paid to the Islesboro municipal entity from the monthly savings for future energy conservation projects. All of this to be metered, billed and delivered by CMP as is done today. There is very little risk to Islesboro. If all else fails and my engineering time and effort are in vain and the legal expenditure is not effective in creating an approved Islesboro municipal power entity the lights on Islesboro will not go out, we simply revert to the power supply Standard Offer we pay now.

Islesboro Electric Power Interest

My interest in Islesboro electric power came about because Kathy and I live here full time and are active in community affairs. I became aware of electrical power cost saving and conservation opportunities for Islesboro because of my previous electrical power management and consulting


work done by my 2 Vermont firms: Control Electric Corporation and Demand Side Services Inc. Control Electric Corporation was affiliated with AEG Telefunken of West Germany. Control Electric imported off peal electric thermal storage heating systems for both residential and commercial customers. Presently there are hundreds of customers operating in New England today. Demand Side Services was in business to manage commercial customer use of electric power in order to save both money and energy.

My electric power load management work included such clients as: State of Vermont, Lockheed Martin Inc, Sugarloaf Corporation, Mt. Mansfield Company, Green Mountain Power, Tennessee Valley Authority, Ontario Hydro, Nova Scotia Power Company, Connecticut Light and Power, Stowe Electric Department, Vermont Public Power Supply Authority municipal electric utilities and hundreds of electric thermal storage heated apartments in Vermont, Massachusetts, and Connecticut plus dozens of non-residential electric thermal storage heated projects.

My electric power career began as an electrical engineer at IBM in Essex Junction, Vermont. I left IBM when I was asked to serve at the Vermont Public Service Board by then Vermont Governor Dean Davis. The Vermont Public Service Board regulates electric utilities in Vermont just as the Maine Public Utility Commission does with Maine electric utilities today. During my service at the Vermont Public Service Board, I received a National Science Foundation grant to review European utilities electrical load management practices and how these practices reduced costs and conserved energy for both the utility and the consumer. Following my service at the Vermont Public Service Board I helped implement load management practices with many utility and commercial clients. My consulting work with the Stowe, Vermont electric utility resulted in me becoming its general manager and director of the Vermont Public Power Supply Authority. After 30 years in Vermont Kathy and I left Stowe to go sailing. During our time in Vermont, we bought and developed property on Broad Cove, Islesboro and have since happily retired here.
