**MUNICIPAL BUILDING PROJECT: UP-ISLAND PUBLIC SAFETY GARAGE, &
PUBLIC SAFETY RENOVATION UPDATE**

Up-Island Public Safety Garage: S. Pendleton reported that the committee has everything
ready for tomorrow's meeting. A crew has made a first attempt at drilling a well, but
didn't find the water they needed. Will report tomorrow.

J. Anderson stated that the well is done. She believes it's 440', and drawing 1 GPM.

 - Each February, they say what we can withdraw. It's been between \$60-\$63,000. That goes toward the Health Center.
 - 7/24/26 email from attorney Kristin Collins re: Holly being an ex-officio and a voting member on the Energy Committee. She sees no reason why Holly can't remain a voting member, as there is no supervisory role between the Select Board and Energy Committee, and they aren't an advisory board.

 - 7/31 Will be Dave Dyer's last day of work. He will continue as Licensed Plumbing Inspector (LPI) until 12/31 when his license expires. The new Codes Enforcement Officer (CEO) will be trained for this position. We are posting for the new Deputy Admin Assistant. We already have four applications.

1. Covered in Town Manager's Report.

OLD BUSINESS

1. Discussion on Ticks.
 - Bill Tilden, former Chair of the Deer Reduction Committee (2nd half of its life), addressed the Board. He stated that the special hunt that was organized in 2013 was a failure. We started with 50 deer/square mile. Three years later, there were 55 deer/square mile. He believes we scared the deer with the shotguns. We couldn't use rifles, so had to be right on top of them. They got scared of humans, and soon the bowhunters couldn't get them. You need to take out a lot of deer up front, and we didn't do that. The state would not let us do another special hunt, and the committee was retired soon after. Bill believes it's time to try again.
 - Bill added that things have changed. A number of the people that were here then are gone now, and some who were dead against doing anything have gotten sick with Lyme. Their thinking has probably changed. He proposed that the Town have a new vote on this issue.
 - Bill has been really sick from Lyme infections. It's been difficult to live with, and he got to the point of questioning how much more he could take. He has a theory that with some deaths in this town, Lyme may have been involved. Some people have a strong enough immune system to keep it at bay, but if they get pneumonia or some other serious illness, it suddenly jumps on top and knocks them down. We should do something to try to stop this.
 - Bill proposed a strategy:
 1. Leave the Deer Reduction Committee inactive. Form a new committee and call it the "Lyme Eradication Committee" or something like that. Leave the deer out of it.
 2. The new committee should have three to five members, well vetted. Make sure those people are committed to the mission.
 3. If taking it to Town Meeting, phrase it as "to do what's necessary to reduce Lyme on the island." Don't make it about deer or a specific solution. Leave it open-ended.
 4. Have a one-time vote. Don't phase it like we did last time.

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- P. Rothschild stated that there was a lot of research done by the previous committee prior to going to the Town for a vote. They came up with a program with White Buffalo that made sense and would work in other places. They made a compelling case. He asked Bill what the program would be to address this problem. It's not just Lyme, but many other tick-borne illnesses.
- Bill added that White Buffalo cleared all the deer from Monhegan, and since then, there has been no Lyme. Some people like the hunting the way it is on Islesboro, and that's what we're up against.
- H. Fields stated we've gone past the time for this. What we've been doing isn't working. People need to say, for the good of the community, we're wrong. It's our responsibility to our citizens to take care of this.
- P. Anderson stated Bill might be onto something with recent deaths in town. As much as he would hope to find a way around mowing down the deer, he'd rather we survive than they survive. We do have to take aggressive action. He agrees that it's time to get this discussion going again.
- D. Purington stated he agrees it's worth exploring.
- Kate Misenheimer stated that Lyme destroyed her life. However, eradicating deer is not realistic because they can swim to the island. That's the big difference between us and Monhegan. She wasn't here the last time this was voted on, but she heard that hiring the company was going to be very expensive. If it's ineffective because of our proximity to the mainland, this needs to be a consideration if we're planning to do something that will cost the Town a lot of money.
- P. Rothschild stated that there was a wealthy, seasonal resident who offered to pay for the program the last time, so it wasn't going to cost the Town a dime.
- H. Fields stated that if you take care of the majority of deer, it's easier to manage the few that are left. It's not a good argument to say that for a couple of deer swimming out here, we should do nothing. The numbers are not on our side.
- Daniel Frohling suggested other avenues and techniques that could be considered as a part of this, and not as a substitute, such as baiting the deer, and as they eat, an insecticide is rubbed on them. Rodents also carry ticks. Everyone in the community is concerned about ticks. It's something that people could get behind and participate in.
- P. Rothschild stated we need expertise. It's not just a matter of deciding which techniques we might use. We need a coordinated program.
- H. Fields stated we need a coordinated effort where there are different layers of things that we do. If more people are doing it, it will have an effect.

MOTION BY P. Anderson, seconded by P. Rothschild, to start the process in two weeks at our next meeting to form a small, well-vetted committee to come up with an appropriate solution to the tickborne illness problem on Islesboro. Discussion as bellow. Roll call. Motion passed, 5 yes, 0 no. Unanimous.

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- Amy Mulnix stated she fully supports putting together a group and suggested the group include experts on the science end and also the communication end, so that we tap into the knowledge that other communities have used to message our residents and summer visitors to help us control this.
- D. Purington asked if the person who was offering to pay for the White Buffalo group is still willing to pay. P. Rothschild replied that he doesn't know, but feels there would be sympathy on the part of potential donors in addressing this.
- D. Purington added that he would want to use the data from what went wrong last time so that the new committee can stand on their shoulders. He suspects there will be more support for what is perceived as an extreme measure.
- J. Anderson suggested getting a consultant to lead this, maybe paid.
- P. Anderson updated his motion to say that we start this process in two weeks at our next meeting, so we have ample time to find a consultant and do vetting.
- Amy stated that this is a bigger issue than the deer, which is why she suggested a communication consultant be involved. It might be useful to talk with Chris at the Health Center. Maybe there's a way for us to support putting dogs on the anti-tick thing. Mouse-proofing homes makes a big difference.
- Dan Tutor stated that he was involved in the shooter training for the last effort. He would like to throw his hat in the ring for the committee.

2. Water Usage

- P. Anderson raised this as a follow-up to the discussion at the last meeting. He referred to an article in the PenBay Pilot that referenced Islesboro, telling residents to be mindful of water usage. A number of days later, Fire Chief Murt Durkee issued a burn ban. He's wondering if we've had confirmation that the specific fire pond has had an opportunity to refill, if that process is still continuing, and if we need to think about changing how that process works, so that when we find ourselves in multi-year droughts like we're in now, we don't run the risk of an inadequate water supply for our fire department, based on an individual's ability to use a private fire pond for their own purposes. Recently, there was a discussion about a desire to bridge the divide between seasonal and year-round residents, and the wealthy and less wealthy. A good way to do that would be to find the abusable loopholes, such as using a fire pond in the middle of a drought to irrigate a property.
- J. Anderson stated she doesn't think they were using a fire pond. The owner of the property with the pond has more than one pond.
- P. Anderson added that a few years ago, when some of the Land Use ordinances were being updated, there was discussion about needing to fill swimming pools with water from off island, so as not to stress the water table here. C. Reed confirmed that is in the ordinance now. P. Anderson added that we need to make the same consideration for big irrigation projects.

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- D. Purington asked about putting a tap at Meadow Pond. J. Anderson stated that there is a dry hydrant there.
- S. Pendleton stated that he is in agreement. He added that there is only so much water on the island. Regardless of whether it's a fire pond or not, they still pulled that water out of our water table. We need an approach that doesn't allow people with a certain amount of money to overuse water, causing someone else's well to go dry. He requested that this be addressed at the next meeting, and will be prepared for it.
- Kate Misenheimer stated that the contractor Don Wagner confirmed that it was the fire pond he was drawing from. He said it would replenish, but it hasn't at the rate he said it would, and it's still down. She attended the Groundwater Protection Committee meeting last night. They discussed the low water table, and the fact that we have a single-source aquifer. We all pull from the same thing. We're getting to the point where we need to think about limiting how many wells are allowed per property.
- P. Anderson read Dan Tutor's comments from the chat: The ordinance on pools happened during the Leucadia development issue at Northeast Point. 35,000 gallons is roughly the daily water consumption of the entire year-round population at 50 gal/day.
- P. Anderson stated that's a staggering amount of water. If this town has a fire problem that's out of our control, we're going to be bummed when we've lost.
- P. Rothschild asked for clarification on the existing ordinances. He asked if models of water bans and ordinances that limit the number of wells from other communities can be adapted to Islesboro.
- P. Anderson stated that if the Groundwater Protection Committee is aware of this issue, we should let them work on it. Perhaps we can direct them to focus more on that and come back to us with some sort of theory.

MOTION BY P. Anderson, seconded by H. Fields, to request that the Groundwater Protection Committee explore options for ordinance changes related to high-volume water usage and well-drilling. Discussion as below. Roll call. Motion passed, 5 yes, 0 no. Unanimous.

- P. Rothschild asked about giving them a time frame. They don't meet very often, and just met. The Chair is Pam Larson.
- J. Anderson suggested we get their minutes before taking action.
- Amy Mulnix stated that she believes Pam Larson is a geohydrophysicist, so she would be a good person to consult. We have more than one individual who is watering trees and sod, so making this a Town issue makes sense.

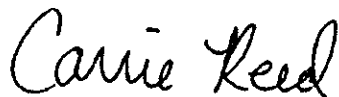

MINUTES

1. Call to Order

Chair Michael Nelson called the meeting to order at 5:06 PM.

2. Establishment of a Quorum

Quorum was established with over 3 members present

3. Approval of minutes of May 5, 2026

Motion: To approve Minutes of May 5, 2026, as written, C. Blackford, seconded by L. Govoni. No discussion.
Roll Call. Motion passed, 4 yes, 0 no.

4. Off Season / School Term Rental Opportunities

- Tom distributed a list of potential rental options and explained that this is a process that he and his wife Sue have done in the past, when new teachers have come to the island. They did some detective work in conjunction with a real estate agent to find places that may never have been rented, but the owners would be willing to rent to a teacher. This process has been successful in the past, and perhaps might be workable on a larger scale.
- Tom confirmed that he sent this list to Jennifer Selendy and Superintendent Connie Brown.
- Cate reported that her family is moving to Camden for the school year and is considering renting out their island house. She has told Principal Kate Legere.

5. Planning Update

- Michael reported that IAP has started heavy-equipment and infrastructure work on next duplex. IAP has also started its annual campaign and outreach, the capital requirements for the duplexes.
- The line item on the budget of \$15,000 for housing was approved at Town Meeting.
- Mike asked for volunteers to put together a proposal for what the committee will use the money for.
- Cate asked if there is anything in what we were proposing with the Island Institute that we might want to explore.
- Michael replied that the potential grant was going to involve interaction with IAP, and this budget money won't, so probably the only thing that would apply from those conversations would be the marketing. He added that it should be spent on something that the Select Board agrees with.
- Peter stated he thinks the idea was that it would be unrestricted. There were no solid guidelines.
- Cate and Lindsey volunteered to work with Michael on ideas.

- Michael reported that Island Institute does not have a housing coordinator. The meeting that was scheduled for last Thursday was cancelled. Michael spoke with Skye Butterson-Dunn today at the Island Institute, who said that they are interviewing candidates.
- Michael added that he also talked with some folks from Chebeague Island. They are exploring putting together a Housing Committee there, and are looking at a "build & sell" model. They don't want the town to own and rent housing, nor have a non-profit to build and manage. They would like to build with a workforce-base price, with no covenants in the sales documents to keep it affordable. The first buyer must be a year-round resident. They have the same set of issues that we have relative to cost of building and attracting people.
- They talked about exploring ways for islands to coordinate. However, coordinating a contract for 6 or 8 houses among various islands does not excite developers. The developers that Michael has talked with have indicated they want a minimum of 5 or 6 houses, all in the same place.
- Cate referred to the water and sewer barriers to density and larger projects that we face, and asked if other islands face these issues.
- Michael replied that other islands do face these issues, as well as other building code issues. The smaller the island, the tougher it is. Monhegan generates its own electricity because they can't bring fuel over. A lot of people rely on wood stoves. Then insurance rates go up. There are waste management systems coming to the forefront that are less expensive and smaller than a traditional septic system, with pre-processing units.
- Cate stated that, given the responses to our survey that people don't want to move here, she's wondering if we want to explore recruitment-style housing, or ways to provide more affordable and better housing for people who are here and underhoused.
- Michael replied that both are needed. We would like tradespeople to come to the island. We also have underhoused people here. IAP had many applicants for the available housing.
- Michael added that we need to finalize the survey report, publish it, and present it to the Select Board. The community deserves to see the results. The lack of interest from non-islanders is data in itself.

Town of Islesboro is pleased to announce it has received a \$1378 dividend check from the Maine Municipal Association because of its good performance and loss prevention efforts. The association manages three self-funded pools for municipal and quasi-public entities in Maine: The Workers Compensation Fund (established in 1978), The Property & Casualty Pool (formed in 1987), and The Unemployment Compensation Fund (formed in 1978). These programs are overseen by governing boards of elected and appointed municipal officials.

This year 81% of program participants received dividends for their effective risk management practices and favorable loss experience. Specifically, the Workers Compensation Fund distributed nearly \$725,000 in dividends, while the Property and Casualty Pool paid out almost \$600,000. In total, over \$1.3 million was returned directly to Maine Municipal Association members.

Since 1997, the association has consistently provided dividends, resulting in over \$30 million returned to participating members.
